



## Youth Perspectives on Religious Education and Intercultural Respect: A Survey Analysis

The qualitative data collected from open-ended responses further supported these findings. Interestingly, the survey also highlighted a gap in the curriculum regarding the inclusion of non-majority religions. While most students reported learning about Christianity and Islam, fewer were exposed to teachings from religions such as Hinduism, Buddhism, and indigenous belief systems. This lack of representation may hinder students' ability to develop a comprehensive understanding of global cultures and religions, suggesting a need for curriculum reform in religious education.

Overall, the results of this survey indicate a positive correlation between exposure to diverse religious teachings and the development of intercultural respect among high school students. These findings have important implications for educators and policymakers seeking to promote tolerance and understanding in increasingly diverse classrooms.

These activities provide a platform for students to engage meaningfully with their peers, fostering relationships built on mutual respect and understanding. As noted by Banks (2006), such interactions are vital for developing intercultural competence, which is increasingly necessary in today's global society.

However, the survey also identifies significant gaps in the current religious education curriculum, particularly concerning the representation of non-majority religions. This lack of inclusivity not only limits students' understanding of the world's religious landscape but also perpetuates stereotypes and misconceptions about different cultural groups. As highlighted by the National Council for the Social Studies (2013), curricula must be designed to reflect the diversity of the student population and the broader society to promote inclusivity and respect.

To address these issues, educators and policymakers must advocate for curriculum reforms that incorporate a broader range of religious teachings and cultural perspectives. This could include the development of interdisciplinary programs that combine religious studies with social studies, history, and cultural education. Such initiatives would not only enrich students' educational experiences but also equip them with the necessary skills to navigate an increasingly diverse world.

In conclusion, the findings from this survey provide compelling evidence that religious education can significantly influence youth perspectives on intercultural respect. By fostering tolerance and curiosity about different cultures, religious education has the potential to contribute to a more inclusive and harmonious society. Future research should continue to explore the long-term effects of religious education on intercultural attitudes and seek to identify best practices for implementing inclusive curricula in diverse educational settings.
